tag questions - ¿Es verdad? ¿No es verdad?

Las expresiones españolas "¿Es verdad?" "¿No es verdad?" se traducen así:

1. Si la frase es **afirmativa**, se repite el auxiliar en forma **negativa**.

Affirmative Sentence	Negative Tag
She is English, (Ella es inglesa,	isn't she? ¿no es verdad?)

2. Si la frase es **negativa**, se repite el auxiliar en forma **afirmativa**.

Negative Sentence	Affirmative Tag
She isn't American, (Ella no es americana,	is she? ¿verdad?)

Estas reglas se aplican con los verbos: **to be - to have - can - must**.

Tom is American, Margaret isn't German, Abel has got a sister, He hasn't got a brother, Margaret can speak French, She can't speak Chinese, Barbara must be a sweet girl, Abel mustn't be good at skating,	isn't he? is she? hasn't he? has he? can't she? can she? mustn't she? must he?

tag questions - ¿Es verdad? ¿No es verdad?

Si en la pregunta no hay uno de los auxiliares: **to be - to have - can - must**, se usan los auxiliares **do - does o did**.

Margaret **lives** in London,
Tom **doesn't like** museums,
Columbus **discovered** America,
He **didn't discover** Australia,

doesn't she?
does he?
didn't he?
did he?

La misma regla vale para **was/were - had - could**.

Margaret **was** a good student,
She **had** a good memory,
Tom **couldn't remember** French verbs,

wasn't she?
hadn't she?
could he?
